

I came across this article while I was reading the current issue of FireRescue-1 magazine. I could not help but think how accurately it describes our profession and how could I share this with the Jackson Township community who has supported the fire department for years. We chose this profession and we are very proud of it, as I am of my Jackson Township staff that serves you.

"We know what we see is real. We know how it feels. We live with the memories, and know that more will come.

We are tuned in to every aspect of the firefighting life. We know when a brother or sister is lost, and we mourn in our own way, no matter how far away the incident was that took them from us. We do not have to know the name of the deceased, or their story, because we are the people

who make the ultimate sacrifice. Inside every one of us lives a small part of the rest, and we feel the loss more profoundly than people could imagine.

The truth is, this is not the easy life that the general public wants to think it is. This is far more than shopping for lunch, parades, Dalmatians, and Fire Prevention Week. This is life, loss, and tragedy. This is insomnia, and injury, and depression. None of us gets through it unscathed. None of us expect to. Some of us will not get out alive, and we know all too well that the someone could be us.

So we protect the public from whatever misfortune comes their way, and put out their fires, and tend their wounded, and keep them as safe as we can. We pull the dead from the car wrecks, and cover the bodies at fire scenes so the news cameras won't bring the horror into the nation's living rooms. We protect our people from more than just the physical; we keep them from knowing the truth.

The truth is ugly, and devastating. People will tell us that they can imagine how horrific it was for us, but they will never, in a million years, really imagine the depth of that horror.

They will never have to deal with the guilt — the constant mental playback, wondering if only I were a little bit faster, a little bit better, a little more poised, a little more heroic. They will never feel the profound sadness that we do as a result of seeing too much. They will never breathe in the smell of death as it lingers on the recently deceased, before the undertaker does his work. They will never wonder how they will even make it home, and get on with things after what they've witnessed.

They don't have to know about any of it. We let them imagine how bad it can be, and allow them the luxury of thinking that they have imagined it right. They don't have to bear the burden of life at its most raw and powerful. They have the luxury of watching the world go by through their screens — screens that don't scream, screens that don't burn, or bleed.

We let them think that life is fair, with an occasional aberration. We allow them the luxury of the illusion of safety and fairness as life barrels along. They do not need to know how often things veer out of control. They don't have to know what we know. We remember how it felt to be innocent. We know exactly how good it feels to not see the brutal realities that linger just out of sight. We don't want them to know about any of it.

All we want is to keep the people who depend on us far away from the things we dread ... and we want to survive this career with our hope, health and sanity intact."

2019 EMS EXCELLENCE AWARD

On March 8, 2019, Medic 4 was dispatched to a business in the Jackson Township area for unknown respiratory distress. They arrived on scene within three minutes of dispatch only to be presented with a pulseless, non-breathing young female. Following AHA Guidelines and Stark County Standing Orders, they initiated CPR and defibrillated the patient, restarting her heart. The patient was transported to Mercy Medical Center. On Wednesday, May 22, Mercy Medical Center presented their 2019 EMS Excellence Award to Captain Gary Harrison, Firefighter Chip Vincent and Firefighter Mike Anderson for their professional actions in saving this young woman's life. As a bonus, the young woman, Nicole Dingey, was present along with the attending physician, Dr. Anthony Brewer, from the ER as they were presented this award.

THE RIGHT TOOL FOR THE JOB

Police officers utilize many tools. Some are carried on us, some are in our cruisers, and some are even stored on station for special circumstances. Midnight shift officers had occasion to use one of those tools one early morning this past March.

Fortunately, it was not the officer's firearm, it was not their flashlight, it wasn't even their pepper spray, or baton. What tool was so instrumental that helped the officers that night? It was a PET CHIP SCANNER! For those who may not be familiar, the Lloyd Seifer Fraternal Order of Police Lodge, based here in Jackson Township, donated the scanner a few years ago. The scanner has been used to help officers reunite several lost pets with their owners. We think that is a great feat in itself, but this is not why this tool was the hero that night.

It was around midnight when officers were dispatched to a resident's home in the northern part of the Township for a report of a small child and a dog that was found on the caller's property. Officers quickly arrived and attempted to find out where the child lived. Unfortunately, due to the child's young age he was unable to provide that vital information to the officers. More officers arrived and began going door to door in effort to locate where this little one belonged.

After quite some time and many doors being knocked on, officers still were no closer to finding out who this child was or where they lived. It was here when one of the officers was thinking outside the box and recommended they try the chip scanner on the dog who was with the child. After obtaining the scanner they checked the canine and received confirmation that the pet was chipped. Officers were able to contact the owner and confirmed that the child was theirs as well. With assistance from Summit County Sheriff Deputies, officers went to the home of the child. After confirming that it was not a case of neglect, they discovered it was just a sneaky child who knows how to work a deadbolt at a young age!

We are fortunate to have this unique tool, allowing us to better serve the residents of Jackson Township. Awesome job by our midnight shift officers. Way to be resourceful and use your tools! Also great job by the resident who notified us, way to see something and say something! Stay safe all!



GUN LOCKS

The Jackson Township Police Department has partnered with Project ChildSafe to provide free gun locks and gun safety literature to gun owners. Gun locks are available in the lobby of the Safety Center on Monday of each week.

Project ChildSafe is a nationwide program committed to raising awareness about the safe and responsible ownership of firearms, and the importance of securely storing firearms when not in use to help prevent access by unauthorized individuals.

Since 1999, the National Shooting Sports Foundation, through Project ChildSafe, has distributed more than 37 million free firearm safety kits (which include a cable-style gun lock) to gun owners in all 50 states and the five U.S. Territories through partnerships with more than 15,000 local law enforcement agencies.

BODY CAMERAS



In April, all Jackson Township Police Officers began wearing body cameras.

The body cameras will allow officers to record HD video and audio from the officer's point of view. The body cameras will integrate with the dash camera that is mounted in the officer's cruiser. The addition of the body cameras will allow

a more complete picture to be caught on video, whereas the dash camera is limited to what can be seen in front of the cruiser. Body cameras have become an important tool in law enforcement and will help our officers to gather evidence, prosecute cases and document call responses. Our officers tested several body cameras over the past year to determine what was best for our agency. In the end, we have decided to deploy the Axon Body 2 camera, made by Axon.

TWO FULL-TIME POLICE OFFICERS HIRED

On Tuesday, March 26, 2019, Jackson Township welcomed two new full-time officers to the force. Officers Jeff Aynes and Brad Mercier both come with prior law enforcement experience.

Officer Aynes is a graduate of The University of Akron who spent 11 years in the Ohio Army National Guard including a combat deployment to Afghanistan and a relief mission to New York for Hurricane Sandy. After completing the police academy, Officer Aynes worked for Windham Police Department as a part-time officer from 2015 until 2018. He was hired by Jackson Township in December of 2018 where he has served as a part-time patrol officer until he was hired full-time on Tuesday, March 26, 2019.

Officer Mercier came to us after working as a Deputy Sheriff for the Stark County Sheriff's Office from August 2017 until he was hired in Jackson Township as a part-time officer on July 24, 2018. Officer Mercier completed the training program and was working as a solo officer in the patrol division when he was hired as a full-time officer on Tuesday, March 26, 2019.

JACKSON TOWNSHIP 2019 CONSTRUCTION

Jackson Township once again has a full slate of competitively bid construction projects adding to our traffic safety and continuing growth.

- The 2019 resurfacing contract is signed and in place for this summer for \$1,519,794.20 to resurface 17 miles of the most deserving roadways.
- Curbing replacement project of 3,865 feet of deteriorated curbing has been contracted for \$149,480.50 to be completed this summer.
- Striping of 40 miles of major Jackson Township roads

will add to our driving safety. This contract has been awarded for a total cost of \$61,037.61.

• Three township and park parking lots will be resurfaced for a contracted price of \$146,595.50. These parking areas are Township Hall main parking lot area, North Park north parking area by the north fencing, and South Park west parking along Fulton Drive.

- Strip Avenue will be extended north of Home Depot to Applegrove and will be open to the public by June 30. This will see new major north-south through traffic at this new Eagle Street intersection, which will create a major change in driver awareness at the stopped Eagle Street traffic.
- Keck Park access road to a large new commercial area is under construction.
- The new Stark Library – Jackson Township Branch is under construction south of the new amphitheater site next to Fulton Drive and Community Parkway.
- The Jackson Township North Park amphitheater is under contract and moving forward for a completion date in the spring of 2020.
- The new Tam O'Shanter Park area is still in the design phase. Fulton Drive traffic improvements are being studied and designed to help with traffic for the future Stark Parks, Jackson Park, and commercial development.

WINTER SEASON CONCLUSIONS

The past winter season was considered average from the Highway Division standpoint. Twenty-nine occasions called for nighttime ice and snow call outs of drivers. We had one major storm that saw nine inches of snowfall on the roadways. Please call the office if you have yard damage or lost stake markings remaining in your yard.

The winter road salt usage required 3,400 tons, which is nicely controlled with computer-assisted distribution on the trucks. The salt storage bins are already full and ready for next season at a cost of \$68.22/ton as contracted through the Stark County Engineer road salt consortium.

The truck maintenance and downtime was at a minimum due to the expert and efficient certified mechanic crew. A standby spare truck is used to continue to maintain snow and ice removal if necessary.

The conclusion of the winter season is always welcome and allows Highway personnel normal nights at home.

OLD EQUIPMENT REPLACED

One new tractor boom mower has been placed in service to replace a 19-year-old unit. This mower provides mowing on steep banked ditches, hillsides, behind guardrail fence, trees and brush, which dangerously overhang the highway system visibility and safety.

Two new trucks equipped with snow blades and computerized salt distribution systems will replace the two oldest trucks dating to 2001.

A new sign shop truck will replace the old truck from 2005 and will be used to help maintain driving safety on the Township's 203 miles of roadway. Among many other highway services it is used to repair signage or replace signage, which disappears, is run down by errant vehicles, or needs renewed reflectivity for night operation.

Registration to obtain a keycard for the Yard Debris Waste Site is now available. To obtain a keycard go to www.jacksonwp.com and click on the "Yard Waste Site Information" icon on the right side of your screen. Please review the updated information regarding the site and follow the onscreen instructions to register. A credit card and email address is required to complete registration. Only one card per household. Once you have successfully registered, key cards will have to be picked up in person at the Jackson Township Administration Building between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Residents can still access the Yard Debris Waste Site without a keycard during the registration period.

MAINTAINING YOUR PROPERTY

Jackson Township takes pride in its community. Your property is one of the biggest investments that you will make in a lifetime so it is very important to keep your property maintained to prevent deterioration and losing its value. However, sometimes buildings, structures and properties are neglected and must be addressed per the nuisance legislation. The nuisance legislation addresses buildings and structures that are declared insecure, unsafe or structurally defective by the Jackson Township Fire Department or the Stark County Building Department. The Board of Health may also declare the building or structure unfit for human habitation. In determining whether a building is unsafe or structurally defective, factors such as sagging or leaking roofs, missing doors

or windows, doors off hinges, building or shifting foundations as well as being unsecured are considered. The nuisance legislation also addresses high grass in excess of twelve (12) inches, and discarded items being kept on the property such as used building materials, lumber, glass, barrels, windows, tires, roof shingles, automobile parts, scrap metal, inoperable and unlicensed vehicles and appliances.

To avoid having your property considered a nuisance, buildings and structures should be maintained at all times and all discarded items should be removed from the property or stored in a completely enclosed building until the items can be properly disposed of. Grass should be cut on a weekly basis to ensure it does not get overgrown. Keeping your grass maintained and trimmed on a continued basis not only improves the aesthetics of the neighborhood but also keeps your lawn free of unwanted weeds.



JUNK VEHICLES

Ohio Revised Code Section 505.871 allows for the removal of junk vehicles from public or private property.

The **Junk Motor Vehicle definition** per the Ohio Revised Code Section 505.871 has the following criteria:

- A) Three (3) model years old or older;
- B) Apparently inoperable; and
- C) Extensively damaged, including, but not limited to: missing wheels, tires, engine or transmission.



If on public property the Board of Trustees may provide in a resolution for the immediate removal of the vehicle. If on private property the Board of Trustees may provide in a resolution for removal of the vehicle not sooner than 14 days after notice is given to property owner.

It is important to ensure all vehicles located on your property are well maintained in an operable condition, which includes displaying current license plates. Inoperable or junk vehicles as well as those without current license plates may only be kept on a property if stored in a completely enclosed building.



If you receive a zoning, nuisance or junk vehicle violation letter, always contact the zoning department within the specified time period as stated in the letter to avoid a possible fine or nuisance hearing before the Trustees, which can be costly as the fees are assessed to the property taxes for any such hearing at a minimum of a \$140.00 processing charge for certified mail, title search and other administrative costs relating to the nuisance action. The township is always willing to work with residents and businesses to get a violation resolved prior to holding a nuisance hearing.

PROPERTY LINE DISPUTES

Property line disputes are a civil matter. If you have a property line dispute with your neighbor, you are encouraged to hire a surveyor to have your property surveyed to determine exactly where your property lines are located. This will be helpful especially if you are contemplating putting a fence on the property line. Residential fences are permitted to go up to and on the property line when adjacent to another residential property. Therefore, you want to ensure when the fence is installed that it is not encroaching on your neighbor's property to avoid any issues in the future.

EASEMENTS & DEED RESTRICTIONS

The township has no authority to enforce deed restrictions on a property. If a property owner comes to the township to request a zoning permit, as long as the structure is in compliance with the zoning regulations a permit will be issued. If the structure is not permitted per deed restrictions on the property, it would be the responsibility of the homeowners association to enforce the deed restriction.

“When You Have a Spill, Know the Drill”

HOUSEHOLD CHEMICAL EMERGENCIES

Although the risk of a chemical accident is slight, knowing how to handle household products containing hazardous materials or chemicals can reduce the risk of injury.

BEFORE A HOUSEHOLD CHEMICAL EMERGENCY

It is critical to store household chemicals in places where children cannot access them. Remember that products such as aerosol cans of hair spray and deodorant, nail polish and nail polish remover, toilet bowl cleaners and furniture polishes all fall into the category of hazardous materials.

Hazardous household chemicals may include:

- Cleaning products
- Pesticides
- Automotive products like antifreeze or motor oil
- Miscellaneous items like batteries, mercury thermometers and florescent light bulbs
- Flammable products like kerosene, home heating oil, propane tanks and lighter fluid
- Workshop or painting supplies such as paint thinners and turpentine
- Lawn and garden products like herbicides and insecticides

The following are guidelines for buying and storing hazardous household chemicals safety:

- Keep products containing hazardous materials in their original containers and never remove the labels unless the container is corroding. Corroding containers should be repackaged and clearly labeled.
- Never store hazardous products in food containers.
- Never mix household hazardous chemicals or waste with other products. Incompatibles, such as chlorine bleach and ammonia, may react, ignite or explode.
- Never use hair spray, cleaning solutions, paint products, or pesticides near an open flame
- Clean up any chemical spill immediately. Allow the fumes in the rags to evaporate outdoors, then dispose of the rags by wrapping them in a newspaper and placing them in a sealed plastic bag in your trash can.
- Dispose of hazardous materials correctly.
- Save the national poison control number in your cell phone and post it next to landlines in your home 1-800-222-1222.

DURING A HOUSEHOLD CHEMICAL EMERGENCY

Get out of the residence immediately if there is a danger of fire or explosion.

- Stay upwind and away from the residence to avoid breathing toxic fumes.
- Recognize and respond to symptoms of toxic poisoning including:
 - Difficulty breathing
 - Irritation of the eyes, skin, throat, or respiratory tract
 - Changes in skin color
 - Headache or blurred vision
 - Dizziness, clumsiness or lack of coordination
 - Cramps or diarrhea
- If someone is experiencing toxic poisoning symptoms or has been exposed to a household chemical, call the national poison control center at 1-800-222-1222 and find any containers of the substance that are readily available in order to provide requested information.
- Follow the emergency operator or dispatcher’s first aid instructions carefully. The first aid advice found on containers may be out of date or inappropriate. Do not give anything by mouth unless advised to do so by a medical professional.

Discard clothing that may have been contaminated. Some chemicals may not wash out completely.

NEEDS YOUR HELP

Did you know that the Jackson Township Recycling Station is not owned or operated by Jackson Township? It is a 501c4 non-profit that's been around since 1983 with the mission to encourage protection of the environment through education and providing the opportunity to recycle to citizens in the community. It is located in

a Township owned building, but functions under the oversight of a volunteer Board of Trustees, and exists on a Stark-Tuscarawas-Wayne Joint Solid Waste District grant, and the income made from the sales of recyclables.

And that's where your help comes in. As you may be aware, the markets for selling recyclable materials have tanked in recent years, especially the last year. China has

limited the amount of recyclable materials it is purchasing from overseas,

and the markets have plummeted nationally in the US. While there appears to be hope on the horizon of a turnaround over the next few years, it probably will not happen soon enough to save our Recycling Station.

As much belt-tightening as possible has taken place at the Station, with it functioning with a very small staff and using volunteers and court referrals as much as possible. Even for-profit companies have discontinued some of their recycling programs due to this downturn. This has led to more cars and longer lines at the Station. The Recycling Station Board of Trustees and the staff desperately want to keep the doors open and to continue to give residents the opportunity to care for their environment by recycling.

The income from selling our recyclables has been cut in half with this market

situation and the Recycling Station doesn't have enough reserves to stay open the rest of the year. To address this shortfall, the Recycling Station is now requesting a **\$1 donation per car per drop off** to keep the program afloat. If you feel inclined to donate more, even better! Sorting your recyclables prior to coming also helps speed up the line tremendously and is much appreciated. Older teen and adult volunteers are welcome.
